President's Message

The Concord Piecemakers Quilt Guild has a long and fine tradition of putting their considerable skills and creativity to use for those less fortunate. We make Comfort Quilts throughout the year, individually and in small groups. Once a year, we assemble for the Quiltathon to finish scores of quilts that go into the reservoir to be distributed to various worthy individual and organizations.

In the past, Alice Wiggins handled all the distribution alone, but now that she has additional duties at home, Scena Proodian has stepped forward to assist and learn. To take some burden off Alice, please contact Scena with any offerings of comfort Quilts and also with any requests for them.

Because there are so many of our members who work with organizations that can benefit from our efforts, Scena will accept requests for quilts and ask that you provide information about the quilts your charity would like. She has a form on which you can specify the destination organization (including address and point of contact), desired size (be specific), colors, patterns, quantity desired, desired date(s), guild contact person, which guild member will collect and distribute these quilts to the organization (if other than Scena), and additional comments.

Scena will receive all requests and place the list on our new web site. She will also collect all the Comfort Quilts you wish to give her, unless there is another contact person listed for a particular destination on the 'want' list. Periodically, Scena will report to us on the distribution of the Comfort Quilts she receives.

Our web site tells us that "The Concord Piecemakers Guild was founded in 1980 by 17 women with the intent of sponsoring an exhibit of quilted items which would encourage interest in quilting and provide quilters with an opportunity to display their art." While many of us generously create Comfort Quilts, no one in the guild should feel any obligation to do so. The Quiltathon is the only 'official' guild-sponsored event aimed at completing quilts from tops that have been made during the year by members. It is our only meeting for the month of February. As with other guild events, all are encouraged to participate to the extent possible.

Thank you for all you do, in whatever way, for others in our community, local or global.

For this month's program we will welcome Janet-Lee Santeusanio. Janet-Lee has been long-arm quilting for fun and profit for many years. She is also a founder of the Machine Quilting Expo in Manchester, NH. Janet-Lee will entertain us with humorous stories about her journey, as well as discuss how she approaches quilting from a long-arm perspective.

As noted in our Guild yearbook, we are excited to welcome a special speaker in April, Philippa Naylor of E. Yorkshire, England. Philippa will be on her way to Paducah to teach at the AQS show, but will stop for us beforehand. Besides a fascinating lecture at the regular meeting, Philippa will hold 2 days of workshops for us at St. John's Lutheran in Sudbury. The dates are Thursday, April 16 (Fabulous Freemotion Machine Quilting and Trapunto) and Friday, April 17 (Award-winning Finishing Techniques). Philippa is noted for precision sewing and exquisite detail and she will share all her secrets with us. Among her many awards, Philippa has just won the prize for Best Machine Artistry at the 2008 Houston International Quilt Show, for her quilt, "Flower Power." Challenge Quilt Elana Schreiber Sharon Laughlin

This year our challenge is to make something with curves. It can be traditional or an art quilt. It can be king sized or 8 $\frac{1}{2}$ X 11. Our October speaker was Sharon Stroud. She spoke about Dresden Plate guilts. Our workshop is with Sylvia Einstein who will be working with curves. Last year, Karen Eckmeier presented another technique for curves at her workshop.

The challenge is to make something that is beyond your comfort level that contains curves or looks like it is curved such as "storm at sea" or "drunkard path." The idea is to stretch yourself. If you normally sew curved appliqué, you could try curved piecing. If you normally paper piece, try template curves. If you normally use templates, try a free form landscape such as those of Karen Eckmeier.

Our library has many titles for inspirations with authors like Ruth McDowell, Carol Bryer Fallert, Joan Clovin and many others.

The new registration forms are now available in this newsletter. Please read them carefully because there are some changes. Notably, we ask you to take two pictures of each entry, one to attach to the registration form and one to attach to a bag with your quilt.

As a small fundraiser to augment cookie sales, we are offering five inch squares in Chinese take out boxes. This month we ask you to bring in 5" squares that are blue - any shade, any style. Think of how many squares we can produce if everyone brings in one strip of squares!

We continue to ask for our membership to step up and volunteer to take responsibility for committee chairs. The following are still unfilled:

- Layout Design done in the last few weeks before the show

Thank you to Suzanne Fuller who will chair the Silent Auction and Joan Neisser who has volunteered to help Ruth Flynn with data entry. There was a schedule conflict for the woman who volunteered to head up the Gift Shop, so that position is still open.

This is a long list of positions to still be open at this time. We hope that you will consider a position and volunteer. We can not have a quilt show with just a few members taking on too much! Our guild works because *every* member becomes involved in this large undertaking.

New this year is a Silent Auction of small quilts of any description. Look through your completed projects and see if anything fits the bill. Or, make something new with a technique you want to try on a small scale. We can generate income with these quilts. People ask if any quilts are for sale. Here is an opportunity for them.

The main show is an exhibit of our work over the last two years. This includes the miniature challenge, the current curved piecing challenge and projects which you have completed. None of our quilts are judged. All are accepted from beginner to advanced. It is an inspiring display of our talent.

You will need two pictures of each quilt or entry. One attaches to the registration form and one is attached to the actual quilt bag when you deliver it in October, 2009.

Registration Process of actual quilts on Thursday, October 15, 2009, 7:30-10:30.

- **1.** Pick up a bag at the September or October meeting.
- 2. Staple a picture of your quilt securely to the bag, name printed clearly on bag.
- 3. Each quilt needs a bag- no matter how small.
- 4. Bags will be available at registration for those who miss the meetings. Allow time to complete the above process before presenting your quilt at the registration table.

This process will enable those who are designing the show layout to see each quilt and place it appropriately. It will also save this team many hours of work.

Tips for Completing the Quilt Show Registration Form

It's time to think about filling out your registration forms. <u>All</u> the information we request is important to us. It will be used as the basis for the show booklet, the registration day lists, receipts and labels, as well as the layout of the show.

Here are a few helpful hints to make the job easier for you - and for the people who will be entering the data for the show booklet:

- 1. Think about giving a title to your quilt or wearable. All the famous quilters do this! Remember, you're an artist, so act like one!
- 2. Be as accurate as you can with the width and length. These measurements will be used by the Layout Designer in planning the show.
- 3. Be sure to credit the person who quilted your piece if you had someone else do it.
- 4. Write 50-75 words for the description. Do not repeat information you already entered. Think about answering some of these questions and you'll be well on your way to writing an interesting description:
 - Is this your original design? If not, what is the name of the pattern or the design source? Example: This quilt was made from the "Yellow Brick Road" pattern by Terry Atkinson.
 - What was your inspiration? (A place you visited? A painting or photograph? An antique quilt? The style or technique of a particular designer? The fabric?)
 - Did you make this for a special person or to commemorate a special event?
 - Were you experimenting with color or a new technique?
 - Did you take a class to learn this technique?

Thanks for taking the time to give us these details. Your thoughtfulness in completing the registration forms will make it even more enjoyable for those who come to view our show.
