Challenge Quilt

This year our challenge is to make something with curves. It can be traditional or an art quilt. It can be king sized or 8 $\frac{1}{2}$ X 11. Our October speaker was Sharon Stroud. She spoke about Dresden Plate quilts. Our workshop is with Sylvia Einstein who will be working with curves. Last year, Karen Eckmeier presented another technique for curves at her workshop.

The challenge is to make something that is beyond your comfort level that contains curves or looks like it is curved such as "storm at sea" or "drunkard path." The idea is to stretch yourself. If you normally sew curved appliqué, you could try curved piecing. If you normally paper piece, try template curves. If you normally use templates, try a free form landscape such as those of Karen Eckmeier.

Our library has many titles for inspirations with authors like Ruth McDowell, Carol Bryer Fallert, Joan Clovin and many others.

Quilt Show October 16-17, 2009

I attended a NEQM meeting for quilt show chairs and went away with some clever publicity ideas. A "penny sale" idea was to gather fabric scraps (trimmings from sides of a quilt) and leftover strips and sell them for \$5 for a bag or \$0.25 for a sandwich bag for children. A great way to off load those scraps you are not using and stare at guiltily. Please begin saving these strips for sale next fall. Also save coffee cans and large plastic containers for cookie sales.

Get Away Weekend

It's time to sign up and pay for the Getaway Weekend, January 24th and 25th, with options for Friday night, January 23rd and Monday January 26th. These costs can be confusing since there are now so many options. The costs break down as follows:

• Saturday and Sunday: \$160 per person, double occupancy; \$200, single room.

- Friday night: \$75 per person, double occupancy; \$150, single room.
- Staying on Sunday night and sewing on Monday: \$135 per person, double occupancy, \$165, single room.
- For a Sit and Sew day, which includes lunch but dinner is on your own, \$50.

So the totals are:

- Friday + weekend: each person double \$235, single \$350;
- Friday + weekend + Monday: each person double \$370, single \$515;
- Weekend + Monday each person double \$295, single \$365.

Any other combination such as double some time and single other is okay. If you want to come and need a roommate, please let Marian know as soon as possible. See you there!
