## **President's Message**

I'm taking a design class at the Arsenal Center for the Arts with Nancy Crasco. (The class is HIGHLY recommended! It is fabulous!) If you don't know Nancy Crasco's work, you should. Anyway, we got into a discussion about the difference between art and craft. I see myself as an emerging craftsperson. One class member said she sees herself as an artist because she has always wanted to be one. Another said it is the political difference: craft is utilitarian. Art is elevated. Craft really is a type of art. Hmm.

I see craft as getting the making of a quilt right: it really has points, the corners meet in the right place, and the boarders don't wave. It works and is appropriate. I see art as the magic: either you got it or you don't. It says something, it moves you. I aspire to art. I guess my feeling of the difference goes back to my great love of theatre. I know actors who are artists and actors who are crafts people. All of the crafts people think they are artists. People have made careers in acting and do well, but they are acting. I have seen artists that rise above script and become the character. I suppose some would disagree with some of the people I see as artists, but that is part of the whole purpose of feelings.

The best quilt I have done (so far) was a block of the month I made my niece as a wedding gift. People praised the patterns and colors. I didn't do that part, the incredible Kathy Jamieson picked the colors and patterns (she IS an artist). I put it together. Is that craft, following someone else's pattern? I love the quilt, but I didn't put the magic in it, just the love.

I'm not sure of the difference between art and craft. I guess it is a work in progress for me to figure out. But Nancy Crasco told me to take two more art classes and I would feel comfortable calling myself an artist. There is hope!

# Go 'round

You will be making a quilt that is any size and with any materials (new or old, cotton through silk) Size: Mini through king size You may work alone or with a small group Style: traditional, pictorial, abstract

Log cabin block: defined as any block that has strips that go around a center. The center can be any geometric shape with straight edges not necessarily a square. The center does not need to be in the center. It must have at least one strip attached to two sides that are next to each other. Examples of block names that would be appropriate are courthouse steps, white house steps chimneys and corners, pineapple etc.

Here's the scoop on Getaway Weekend 2011:

LOCATION: Colonial Hotel, Gardner, MA.

DATES: Friday January 14, Saturday January 15, Sunday January 16, and Monday January 17<sup>th</sup> (Martin Luther King Day)

PACKAGE: Dinner, a room, and breakfast. This can be applied to Friday, Saturday, and Sunday. STUDIO HOURS: Saturday and Sunday 8:00 a.m. 'til midnight; Monday 8:00 a.m. 'til 5:00 p.m.

The basic getaway is Saturday and Sunday. Meals included are: Saturday lunch and dinner, Sunday breakfast and lunch. If you want to stay late on Sunday but not sleep over until Monday, you will have to buy your own dinner (should you be able to tear yourself away from your sewing). The Sunday night option includes dinner Sunday night, breakfast Monday, and a light lunch Monday. The Friday night option includes dinner Friday and breakfast Saturday. # CONCORD MUSEUM's "A Little Scrap for Recollection's Sake"

The Concord Museum is currently exhibiting quilts from their collection and two from the Alcott House. The exhibition is on until mid March. For the two days after Thanksgiving they included a family program in the barn and invited Concord Piecemakers to participate.

Parents and children came to the barn and made some of the simple blocks available using pieces of fabric prepared with fusible backing. Once they chose their fabrics and placement, a volunteer ironed the fabrics to the blocks. For the "little" people there were markers (many, many colors to choose from) and they sat and colored their quilt designs.

As part of the program, we showed the visitors techniques used in quilting along with some of our work. (The "we" being Chris Lang, Marla Richmond and myself.) Chris was labeling quilts for the Emerson Sale (which led people to ask when it was going to be), Marla was binding a baby quilt (with her sprained thumb) and explaining how to make a professional finish, as well as talking up the Concord Piecemakers, our quilt show next fall and handing out membership apps to a few interested ladies (she also brought one of our picture albums) and I set up my Singer Featherweight, demonstrated paper piecing (I was making Palm Leaf blocks) and explained the history of foundation piecing in the 19<sup>th</sup> and 20<sup>th</sup> centuries.

Adults and children alike "oohed" and "awed" our work and asked the usual endless questions we all hear like "How long does it take to make a quilt?". (One little boy wanted to know what the machine was, what it did and could he make it work? Answer: I don't think so!)

The Education Director was thrilled to have us. She explained how it added so much to the event and many who saw the exhibit said how much more they appreciated the show having seen "real" quilters at work and the amount of time needed to make a block, never mind a whole quilt. In the two days I completed 16 parts for two blocks! Not the actual blocks, mind you - so much to talk about.

So much fun and the time just flew. We even offered to supply labor for future events! So drop by the museum and check out the exhibition. You'll feel the connection.
