Dearly Beloved,

Grace and peace to you.

Last weekend the Sanctuary and most of the other rooms of St. Matthew's were filled with quilts for the Concord Piecemakers Quilt Show; some were made by members of St. Matthew's. Beth is a quiltmaker; I'm just an appreciator. I love the way quilters bring together various fabrics, different colors, designs, and textures into a beautiful whole that is more than the sum of the parts.

Many patchwork quilts are made with scraps, pieces of old shirts and sheets and dresses and curtains, each aged in its own way, each with its own story. Some may have once been fine fabrics; others as plain as feed sacks. The quilter takes all these different pieces and makes them into a whole. Sometimes she creates a certain design, but not always. But always what make it beautiful are not the individual pieces, but that they have been sewn together into a whole. And so it is with the church. The church is a patchwork quilt of many lives, different stories, various gifts, needs and manifestations of the Spirit, brought together into one imperfect, yet perfectly beautiful whole. One of us rejoices while another is in deep sorrow. Each has certain needs, certain gifts. What makes it beautiful is each person's presence and connection with all the others, in contrasting as well as complementary combinations. It's not any one piece that makes the quilt; it's the relationships, and how we each give of ourselves to the others.

No one person's dreams will determine our story. No one's financial gifts will make or break this church. But God will use the fabric of our generosity and the weaving of our commitment to create something beautiful.
