


## Nickel Squares Barbara Weiss

### **NEW 9 PATCH EXCHANGE is about to kick off!** Polina Shapiro

Wayside Quilting Guild's recent show had a variety of stunning quilts based on their exchange of 3  $\frac{1}{2}$  "9 patch squares.

We're organizing the same swap at our guild.

The rules are super simple: once a month every participant will have to make not less than 10 or more than 20 squares. The number will depend on how many people sign up.

Each square should have two contrasting fabrics and measure EXACTLY 3 <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>" (to the best of each participant's abilities (we don't want anyone to be over obsessed about it) but do your best. It's a great way to use your scraps. All squares may be the same two colors or each one can be a different color combination that alternates light and dark values..

We would start swapping at our November meeting and will continue for 12 months. Each participant will end up with around 180 blocks, depending on how many people sign up for the exchange. Then we'll have almost 2 years to turn them to beautiful quilts for the next 2021 show. The sky is the limit.
