Silver Lining

There is a silver lining! That's the good news. After our first successful Zoom Guild meeting in April, the Board has held two topic-specific "Town Hall" discussion meetings via Zoom for any members who wanted to join in the conversation. I'm impressed by the number of members participating in these discussions.

Shortly after our April meeting we offered up a Town Hall meeting to debrief the Quiltathon. Sixteen members "attended" that meeting and provided great feedback. The only real change that came out of that meeting is a desire to use the church's Youth Room for our lunches in the future. Again, a silver lining. We wouldn't have known about lunch in the Youth Room if we hadn't had to unexpectedly move this year's Quiltathon activities upstairs! In addition we recognize the need to emphasize that folks can participate for the morning, or the afternoon, and are not expected to put in a full day's work.

This week we held our second Town Hall meeting to discuss how to proceed as a guild considering 1) the reality of the virus hanging around into the fall and beyond, and 2) that no one has volunteered to be vice-president next year. We had 22 members participating in this thoughtful discussion. As for Zoom meetings, many expressed frustration about not getting together, but we assured everyone that we would move back to Harvey Wheeler as soon as it was safe to do so. Meanwhile, there are advantages to Zoom meetings. We don't have to drive to meetings, and we can have presenters from anywhere (no driving, no flying, and cost savings at that!). We can even hold some workshops via Zoom. Our program chairs are working hard to fill this need.

In addressing the difficulty in getting volunteers for leadership roles, we discussed ways in which we need to move toward more sharing of responsibility for all guild functions. We may need a consortium of leadership sharing the tasks. Linda and I will remain in our roles as President and Vice-President, and we are committed to working with the Board next year to transition to new approaches to shared leadership.

Secondary Designs in Quilts with Jen Sorensen

With the right use of color and block placement amazing secondary designs really make a quilt sing, according to Jen. Her interactive workshop will be a combination of Jen speaking, individual exercises to learn, and a group discussion. First she will discuss historical and traditional quilts that use secondary designs, and then we will do an exercise to help us notice these designs. Then she will talk about her design process of creating secondary designs in her own quilts and what she finds most effective. Again, she will follow this with a short exercise for us to explore secondary designs. The last topic is how to design your own unique quilt. (Copyright issues are eliminated! If your work is original.) Breaks and time for informal discussion will be provided. Maybe we can enjoy lunch together afterwards on Zoom just to socialize?

The workshop is 10 a.m.-1 p.m., and yes, you can come in your pajamas if you want! The materials will be available through Jen's Etsy shop and must be downloaded ahead of time. The cost is \$25. The meeting number will be distributed with the pattern. So don't let those stacks that we have now (about 70 completed, which includes the label!), slow you down. We are getting a nice number now that are gender neutral, so thank you for that, as well. Keep at it!

Remember, there are bins in my trunk, released from afar, in which you can pick through scraps, backings, and now larger chunks that Joy has been collecting for us from various members. I'm also happy to cut batting for comfort quilts.
