Also, we hope to set up a time for a Sit and Sew ZoomBee, with everyone working on their own project. And for those who would like company while tying quilts, a Quilt Tying ZoomBee. How about a Scrap ZoomBee to have fun with scrappy ideas presented by Christina Cameli at our October guild meeting?

Perhaps you have an idea and would like to start a ZoomBee at a time that works for you and others, either with a specific shared project in mind, or just a time to sit and sew together. Please let me know what you have in mind, so that we can offer all guild members the opportunity to join.

My president's Zoom account can be used for all these ZoomBees. If you are particularly tech savvy and would be willing to assist a potential ZoomBee leader who lacks tech confidence, please let us know. Thanks.

Her patterns typically make a large double bed-sized quilt, but you can make a third or a half of the blocks each week to make a smaller quilt, as her patterns are usually symmetrical.

We will meet on Fridays from 10-12 on zoom to share our progress and share any tips we have learned during the week.
