

### **Comfort Quilts**

The last donation of the year went to Emerson Hospital in December to include 50 (!) pillow cases, 12 pediatric quilts, and 2 special nursery mats. We gave away 137 quilts last year, mostly to Household Goods, Emerson, and the VA, with a few to members for friends and family in need of some comfort. That leaves us with 55 (minus an early January run of 10 to the VA and 8 to Household Goods) quilts of the lap size because the request for those has dried up, except for pediatric ones and gender-neutral VA ones. I know this log jam will break; I'm told the Naka Center is starting to ramp back up. I have been exploring other hospitals that have a chemo center, but the holidays have slowed the response. Meanwhile, if the quilts you make for Quiltathon were a tiny bit longer, in the 70-inch range, they would be most welcome at household goods, whose clients are most eager for your beautiful work to brighten their beds.

#### PILLOWCASES FOR EMERSON HOSPITAL

Thank you to those who have already made pillowcases for the children at Emerson Hospital. With the Getaway a few days away, we have the opportunity to add to the donations that have already been made. It's helpful if you would wash the fabric ahead of time, but if you can't, we will wash the pillowcases after the Getaway. If you're not going to the Getaway, you can still donate.

Here are the fabric requirements:

3/4 yd of non-directional fabric or 1 1/4 yd of directional fabric for body 1/4 yd for cuff

2"-3" for decorative band

There are directions on our website and many on YouTube. Search for "magic pillowcase".

For those who are new to the guild here's the history of what we've done in the past.

Many years ago, guild members of CPM began making pillowcases for a charity originally called "ConKerr Cancer" started by a mother whose son was hospitalized for cancer treatment. She noticed that everything in hospital bedding was WHITE!

Thus began a charity of friends, quilters, and others nation-wide making colorful pillowcases to brighten hospital rooms. CPM members contributed hundreds of cases to this charity. Now we have the opportunity to make cases for Emerson Hospital.

# **Household Goods Sewing Kits**

This is an ongoing project for making sewing kits for Household Goods in Acton. We are especially looking for scissors and tape measures right now. But the following is the full list:

Sturdy containers (metal, plastic) with lids to hold the supplies, tape measures, scissors (particularly 6" or less, though all sizes are fine. (No pinking shears please), thread\*\*\* (any color, partial spools are fine), pins, safety pins, needles, and buttons that you are going to throw away. Also useful are very tiny boxes for pins, and bobbins or small embroidery floss cardboard organizers to wind thread on.

\*\*\*Partial spools of thread - all types, colors are VERY welcome. Some of the thread only needs enough length to sew on a few buttons or make a hem. Please - no general crafting supplies, however.
