Amazing Abstracts Workshop via ZOOM with Julia Graves:





Create an abstract quilt that has amazing movement and drama, using the techniques pioneered by Ursula Kern. Go from inspiration to a simple sketch, then have fun "coloring" your sketch with bits of fabric to create a mock-up of your design – see before you sew! The design is gridded and blocks are foundation pieced using an easy sew and flip method with room for creativity and improvisation. Lots of discussion of design principles and how to use color and value to create the drama and desired effects.

Note: On-line classes will be conducted in two parts – Part 1 will develop the design and Part 2 will focus on sewing.

Julia Graves – Quilter, Longarmer, Teacher and Artist, Julia started her quilting business, Special Occasion Quilts LLC, in 2007. She won Best Longarm Machine Workmanship Wall Quilt Category at the 2016 Mid-Atlantic Quilt Festival. Her quilts have been published in books by Gloria Loughman, Katie Pasquini-Masupust and MJ Kinman. Julia was an Artist in Residence at Empty Spools in 2019, and taught at Empty Spools in 2021 and 2022. Julia has made more quilts than she can count, many for charity, and is partial to scrap quilts and working with color to achieve amazing results. Julia lives in Leesburg Virginia.

Making such an abstract quilt may not appeal to you and may take you out of your comfort zone, but it may be just the ticket for making a quilt for that young person in your life who isn't overly excited with traditional quilts. This workshop presents a novel way to use scraps, perhaps learn a new quilting technique, and will teach you how to make a quilt that is entirely different! I can't wait to see what we all create! Household Goods Sewing Kits

This is an ongoing project for making sewing kits for Household Goods in Acton. We need...

Sturdy containers (metal, plastic) with lids to hold the supplies, tape measures, scissors (particularly 6" or less, though all sizes are fine (No pinking shears please), thread*** (any color, partial spools are fine), pins, safety pins, needles, and buttons that you are going to throw away. Also useful are very tiny boxes for pins, and bobbins or small embroidery floss cardboard organizers to wind thread on.

***Partial spools of thread - all types, colors are VERY welcome. Some of the thread only needs enough length to sew on a few buttons or make a hem.

Sweatshirt Jacket

Instructions and supplies for first class

Sweatshirt

Before buying your sweatshirt, decide if you want to patch it, like my 30's jacket and Donna's black jacket, or if you will cover the entire jacket with fabric. If you are patching, you will see the base color around the patches. If you are covering the whole jacket, remember that the sweatshirt comes with ribbing on cuffs and neck. They can be cut off later if you wish. Otherwise, ribbing will match the sweatshirt.

Purchase 1 sweatshirt, 2 sizes bigger than you usually wear, *not a hoodie*. If you run out of ladies' sizes, go to men's. I used a man's XL for my 30's jacket.

Heretical statement: 50% cotton, 50% poly sweatshirts work fine. Don't obsess on 100% cotton. Many more colors in the 50-50.

Having purchased your sweatshirt, wash and dry it twice. That gets rid of everything on it, including a lot of fuzz, possible dye problems, and shrinkage. Yes, the 50-50 ones shrink a little.

Do not cut the sweatshirt; bring it whole to class.

Fabric

One of the nice parts of these jackets is that they are washable, so please wash your fabric. You do not want it shrinking after it is on the jacket. If you are patching, cut lots of patches. 3– 6-inch squares work nicely, but the patches can be any size or shape. Lots of small patches will require lots of stitching to hold them on. This is a great place to use decorative threads.

If you are covering the whole jacket, start "making fabric" by stitch and flip until you have pieces that will cover maybe 1/4 to 1/2 of a side or arm of the sweatshirt.

Other supplies

Sewing machine in working order, wind several bobbins, 90/14 needle. You will be going through thick fabric. If you want to use decorative threads, a 100/16 topstitch needle will make life easier. If you want to zig-zag or use your machine's decorative stitches, make sure to have a wide plate and presser foot.

Good shears: you will eventually be cutting the sweatshirt.

Pins, thread of your choice (consider using decorative threads as well as construction thread).
