# News From the New England Quilt Museum

Through April 27, The **Quilted Canvas IV** is the final exhibition in a series that began in 2017 at the New England Quilt Museum to recognize and celebrate America's pioneering art quilters. This fourth installment features the works of **Ruth McDowell**, **Jude Larzelere**, **Tafi Brown** and **Jo Diggs**. Video programs by Ruth McDowell and Jo Diggs are playing continuously on a monitor in the gallery.

Through June 15, following the success of her 2021 exhibition *Great American Road Trip*, the NEQM is delighted to welcome back fiber artist **Dawn Allen**. Her latest series **Domestic Partners** captures the relationships that humans share with their animals.

Beginning on April 30 through July 13, NEQM is proud to host the world premiere of SAQA's global exhibition, **StitchPunk**. The imaginative textile arts and three-dimensional works in this traveling exhibition explore a variety of science fiction themes and sub-genres of which "steampunk" is perhaps the most widely known across cultures. For some, steampunk is a source for creative inspiration. For others, the idea of a world set in a past that never happened and a future that will never be simply offers more optimism than the real one.
