 typically dwindle at this time of year. If you'd like to bring a new or gently used small
 household item to the December meeting it would be much appreciated. This might be a
 good time to declutter your kitchen drawers or linen closet. Suggested items include:
 kitchen spatulas, knives, measuring cups, dishes, glasses, pots,
 towels, bedsheets, blankets, quilts, afghans, lamps, fan, or toaster. Please ensure the

Comfort Quilts

Quilts were donated to North Star Family Services in Leominster this month. I brought twin size quilts for use in their family emergency shelter and throw blanket size quilts that they will include as part of the welcome baskets for new families that they help. They were VERY excited to receive the quilts and were amazed at how many beautiful quilts our guild makes each year. I will also complete nursing home deliveries in early December. Please contact me if you would like to recommend a specific facility.

At the December meeting, I will again bring potential fabric for comfort quilts that might go well with a nickel square packet that you picked up at the last meeting. This fabric can also be used for borders, sashing, and backing. Please bring a sample of your project(s) to help finding complementary fabric. I can also bring batting cut to whatever size you need if you email me ahead of time. Please remember to sew on the CPM labels to your comfort quilts. I will bring labels as well.

I emailed the recommended sizes for quilts most needed to everyone this month. Here they are again plus one addition for larger quilts.

Biggest Need:

- Twin bed size for Acton Household Goods, family shelters, and other organizations 55 x 70" minimum up to 68 x 86" ideal size
- Quilts with kid and teen themed fabric for Emerson Pediatrics between 32 x 40" and 40 x 50" for most, and smaller for little kid themed fabric

Smaller Need:

- Throw blanket size for nursing homes, Acton Household Goods, and other organizations around 48 x 60"
- Quilts of Valor for service members and veterans (Bedford VA is overwhelmed with donations) 60 x 80" ideally, but no smaller than 55" x 65", must also have gender neutral, patriotic fabric and be machine quilted (not tied)
- Double and queen bed sizes for Acton Household Goods 80 x 85" minimum for double and 85 x 95" minimum for queen

Woven Bag Workshop - Saturdays January 18th & February 1st, Pompositticut Community Center, 509 Great Rd, Stow, MA

This 18" x 12" lined shoulder bag is first pieced, then quilted, and finally assembled, complete with a double zipper and two or three interior pockets. The woven design is created by piecing various shades of one color (or a focus fabric with complementary colors) with narrow strips of black to make the colors pop. This bag was designed by Carol Stapleton of San Mateo, CA.

You will need the following gear:

- Sewing machine, foot pedal, and power cord
- Sewing machine manual (just in case)
- ¹/₄" piecing foot
- Zipper foot
- Walking foot
- Needles—Size 80 for piecing and size 90 for quilting and assembling the bag
- 50 wt. thread for piecing (same color as bag) and black 50 wt. thread for quilting
- Cutting mat and rotary cutter, ruler (6 ¹/₂" square or other small ruler)
- Small scissors, seam ripper, pins, etc.
- Quilting gloves (optional but highly recommended)

You will need the following fabric

- 12 to 16 fabrics (or more) of various shades/prints in one color of your choice. Or you
 may want to use one focus fabric for every other square, and complementary fabrics to
 fill in. You will need enough for 108 2 ¹/₂" x 2" rectangles, but having a few extras is
 good.
- ³⁄₄ yard black fabric
- 1 yard lining (to match color of bag), darker is better
- 1 yard fusible fleece (Pellon 987F) *
- ¹/₂ yard batting
- 18" to 22" purse zipper with double pulls*

I will provide:

- Complete instructions
- Plastic canvas for bag bottom insert
- Basting spray

*I may be able to provide the fusible fleece and zippers, so hold off on those for now.

Please sign up with Carol MacFarlane, Tina van Roggen or Leonie Davis by January 8th. We'd like to know who is interested so that we can schedule a Zoom session for initial instructions to prepare us for the first class.



Proposed Bylaw Change – Associate Membership Category

The Board has voted to discontinue the Associate Membership category. It no longer applies to the guild and it serves no purpose. The benefits of full and associate memberships are the same except for voting rights. Associate members cannot vote on guild business. The Associate category was developed many years ago, when newsletters and membership books were mailed rather than emailed and associates did not get the mailings. Associates were only allowed to exhibit in the Quilt Show if there was space available. We have not had space issues in recent years. Associates are also supposed to pay a \$5 fee to attend meetings, and we have been erratic in collecting the fees.

The Bylaw Committee will review this proposal and if accepted, will present it to the membership. We will vote on the bylaws change at the April meeting.

3. Maybe you want to use totally different colors that's ok.

Remember, Bonnie's quilts use tiny pieces 1 1/2-inch blocks or strips are not unusual so if you do not like to work with small pieces chose another project.

Come sew with us. We can't tell if you are working on the BH mystery, last year's mystery, or something else. This is a great way to get to know your fellow guild members.
