Comfort Quilts

What a year this has been! I cataloged 116 quilts finished by members last year with many more in progress. You all have been busy!

In the past year, I delivered 130 quilts to a wide variety of groups including Emerson Hospital Pediatric Unit, several nursing homes in the area, Acton Household Goods, NorthStar Family Services in Leominster and GAAMHA Dahl House in Gardner. This past month, I also brought throw size quilts and kid themed quilts to Heywood Hospital in Gardner for their labor and delivery nurses to give to new families in need. A few quilts also went to the Virginia Thurston Healing Garden, but they have a very limited need for quilts. I also enjoyed delivering the pillowcases and special baby mats that Nanette, Sue, and Eileen collected. What an impact we have made!

As you think about what you might make over the summer, here is information about what is needed. Please remember that adding just one more row of blocks might make your quilt longer.

BIGGEST Need:

Twin bed size for Acton Household Goods, family shelters, and other organizations 55 x 70" minimum up to 68 x 86" ideal size

Quilts with kid and teen themed fabric for hospitals like Emerson Pediatrics
between 32 x 40" and 40 x 50" for most smallest for little kid themed fabric

Needed:

Throw blanket size for nursing homes, Acton Household Goods, and other organizations around 48 x 60"

Quilts of Valor for service members and veterans 60 x 80" ideally, but no smaller than 55" x 65" - must also have gender neutral, patriotic fabric and be machine guilted (not tied)

- must also have gender heutral, pathotic labric and be machine quitted (not tied)

Smallest Need:

Wheelchair size for nursing homes around 36 x 45"

As usual, I can bring batting in the size you need for your comfort quilt to the June meeting as well as labels. Many fabric options are available for backing or sashing upon request. Feel free to contact me over the summer as well! I know that some of us prefer piecing and some prefer quilting. If you would like to do just part of a quilt, please contact me about what is available.



News from the New England Quilt Museum Martha Supnik

May 6 through August 9, 2025 Quilts Japan: The 17th Quilt Nihon

The NEQM proudly presents an exhibition of award-winning quilts and textile arts from some of world's most accomplished artists in *Quilts Japan: The 17th Quilt Nihon*.

For more than a decade, the New England Quilt Museum has been the exclusive Northeast host for this celebrated exhibition, which premieres at the Tokyo Metropolitan Art Museum before traveling internationally. It features some of the most extraordinary and innovative works from the biennial competition of the Japanese Handicraft Instructors' Association (JHIA), which sponsors the largest international quilt contest in Japan and one of the most prestigious in the world. This year's Quilt Nihon Exhibition features 53 award-winning and notable works, including 18 entries from the competition's newest category--miniature quilts.

The Art of Make Do Quilting: Mary Kerr, Curator through June 21, 2025

The NEQM is pleased to host Mary Kerr's vintage collection of "Make-Do" quilts and the contemporary versions they inspired her to create. She explains, "The theme of Make-Do Quilting has been present during every era of our quilt making history. If you run out of fabric, use something else. If you need an extra border, add one. If you are short on skills or talent, make it work. Use up those leftover blocks as you mix, match and create. This quirky attitude adds to the charm of our quilts. It focuses on the ability to adapt and readjust midstream. It reflects our unique determination and creativity. We make do with what is on hand. We finish projects left undone. We add to what was started and make it our own."

Showing Off: Permanent Collection Quilts through June 21, 2025

In previous centuries, quilts were primarily made to provide warmth on the bed. However, some quilters made special quilts that showed off their fine needlework skills. These special quilts were displayed on the bed only when company visited, and many have survived in good condition. These quilts were treasured by the family and passed down to later generations.

Pat Pauly: Unfolding Years June 24 - Sept 20, 2025

With works that carry a graphic, color-saturated palette using her hand printed fabric, Pat Pauly's fiber art is seen around the world. Her textile work began in the early 1980s and was first accepted in Quilt National '83, and has continued being shown in major exhibitions. Her fiber art's distinction is with using a strong abstraction of natural forms and complex color combinations.
